### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

A study of the nature of language relevant to teachers involved with other languages and cultures. The course covers the basic techniques for analyzing phonological, morphological, syntactic and semantic structures. It also examines language in its social context and acquisition, writing systems, and universals.

- 1. To understand a range of topics in the field of linguistics.
- 2. To analyze the phonological, morphological, syntactic, and semantic features of English.
- 3. To sensitize students to the similarities and contrasts of sound and structure in different language systems.
- 4. To understand linguistic concepts and definitions as they relate to other languages and other disciplines.
- 5. To develop transcription skills.
- 6. To make acquainted with different writing systems and theories of universal grammar.
- To foster students' mastery of New Jersey Professional Teaching Standards (NJPTS) 1 (Subject Matter Knowledge) and 8 (Communication).

At the completion of this course, students are expected to:

- 1. define of a range of topics/concepts in the field of linguistics.
- 2. distinguish basic linguistic units and features (e.g. phonemes, morphemes, phrase structure, semantic features) at the sentence level.

- 4. explain how a scientific method of language investigation contributes to other disciplines (e.g. psychology, sociology).
- 5. transcribe a simple text using phonetic symbols.
- 6. categorize different writing systems and describe universal grammar.
