Let me first say, I'm looking forward to working with all of you this semester. Many of you may be thinking that a semester studying "classical" music is going to be painful, boring and pointless. I promise you that whatever it will be, it will not be any of those things. I try to make it an interesting and enjoyable experience that will expand your knowledge of and appreciation of all music.

You may also be thinking that music is already a big part of your life. In fact, in our society, music everywhere, even in airports, elevators and department stores. Recordings have made it possible to have music anywhere and any time you want it. And the variety of styles and genres available makes it possible for each person to create a musical universe of their own-- and store it in a device small enough to fit in your pocket. Given all this, one might assume that music is well appreciated in our world. So why do you need to take a course about appreciating it? The answer to that question is what I hope we will discover in the next 16 weeks.

What you will be doing this semester is reading, writing, listening and thinking about music. We will be spending a lot of time on European classical music but at the same time we will be considering our own musical culture, the world of jazz, blues, folk and "rock and roll". The details of course procedures, quizzes and exams, papers an Discussions will be provided in the Syllabus which will be available on the first day if class.

The text we will be using is Roger Kamien's "Music; An Appreciation", 7th Brief Edition. It comes with a set of 5CDs. The ISBN number is 007743353X. We will also be using McGraw Hill's Connect website this semester. This site will be used mostly for exams, quizzes but it also has features that will help you get more out of the course. It will especially aid you with the listening aspects of the course. Listening is often the hardest part of the course particularly for those with little or no musical experience. The listening outlines in Connect will guide you through all of the musical examples in a clear, concise way and are easily understood regardless of your level of musical knowledge. All of this is much simpler than it sounds so don't panic. My goal is to create an enjoyable, instructive and stress free course. And I will do my best to see that it will be exactly that.
