# 2019 Subsequent Enrollment of Accepted Students (SEAS) Study

A Closer Look at Students who Declined to Enroll after their Acceptance to William Paterson

#### Introduction

The Subsequent Enrollment of Accepted Students Study is conducted annually by the Office of Institutional Effectiveness. The purpose of the study is to take a closer look at students who were accepted to William Paterson, but declined to enroll. The report is organized into three sections.

- Section I. addresses the question "Which students are declining to enroll?" by analyzing data from our institutional database. This section examines the demographic and academic profiles of Fall 2019 admitted students who declined to enroll and compares them to students who were admitted and enrolled to see which students we are losing based on these characteristics.
- Section II. addresses the question "Where are those who declined going?" by analyzing data queried from the National Student Clearinghouse. This section breaks down those who declined into two distinct groups: students who opted to enroll elsewhere and those who are not attending college at this time. Both groups are analyzed with a special focus on the enrollment behavior of those who enrolled elsewhere.
- Section III. addresses the question "Why did these students decline to enroll?" by analyzing survey data from our annual SEAS Survey. The instrument asks those who declined about their future plans, whether their reasons for not attending William Paterson were institutional or personal, and what would have persuaded them to enroll at William Paterson University.

#### Methodology

The annual study uses admissions data to define its population. The study looks at new degree-seeking students who were admitted to William Paterson University, but declined to enroll in Fall 2019. This population is compared to the population of students who were accepted and enrolled at William Paterson in Fall 2019.

#### Section I. - Which students are declining to enroll?

#### **DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE**

**Gender:** Although more females enrolled at William Paterson University than males in Fall 2019, a higher percentage of admitted males enrolled (27 percent) compared to female admits who enrolled (21 percent).

**Race/Ethnicity:** The majority of admitted students to William Paterson in Fall 2019 were Hispanic (36 percent), and Native American students enrolled at the highest rate (29 percent), though the total number of admits was low (N=14).



**Age:** An analysis of age showed that the mean age of those who declined was slightly younger (19 years of age) than those who enrolled (21 years of age).

#### **ACADEMIC PROFILE**

**Admission Category:** The percentage of Freshmen who were admitted to William Paterson and enrolled (18 percent) was substantially lower than the percentage of transfers who were admitted and enrolled (53 percent).



#### A Closer Look at the Non-Enrolled Who Entered WP as Transfers

**Class Level at time of Admission:** Students at higher class levels (with more earned and accepted credits) enrolled at a higher rate.

**Major:** When looking at majors with ten or more students admitted in Fall 2019, majors with the lowest decline rates were Music (B.A.), Art (B.F.A.), Music (B.M.), Liberal Studies (B.A.), and Communication Disorders (B.A.). Majors with the highest decline rates were Actuarial Science (BS.), Integrated Math and Science (B.A.), Health Studies (B.S.), Political Science (B.A.), and Mathematics (B.S.).

#### Section II. – Where are those who declined going?


To determine the subsequent enrollment activity of those who declined to enroll, this subset of 7,728 students was submitted to the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC). The National Student Clearinghouse is a non-profit organization created by the higher education community that maintains enrollment and graduation data for over 98 percent of U.S. college students from over 3,600 colleges and universities. The 'StudentTracker' service provided by the NSC allows colleges and universities to track the subsequent enrollment of their students.<sup>2</sup>

**Subsequent Enrollment:** The majority (84 percent) of admitted students who declined to attend William Paterson University in Fall 2019 subsequently enrolled at another institution. The rate of subsequent enrollment has remained roughly the same as prior fall semesters.

**Subsequent Institution Type:** Eighty percent of students who enrolled at another institution enrolled within the state of New Jersey. Fifty-seven percent of those who remained in New Jersey subsequently attended four-year public institutions. The majority (52 percent) of those who pursued their education outside of the state went to four-year private institutions.

**Institutions of Choice:** The top institutions where those who declined subsequently enrolled were Montclair State University, Kean University, Ramapo College, Rutgers University (Newark), Bergen Community College, Rowan University, and New Jersey City University.

Major at 4-year Institution: The top five majors students selected at their subsequent four-year institutions of choice were Unknown, Undeclared, or unspecified (27 percent); followed by Psychology, Nursing, and Biology (table 8).

**Major at 2-Year Institution:** The top five majors students selected at their subsequent two-year institutions of choice were Unknown, Business Administration, General Associates Professional Studies, Criminal Justice, Health Science, and Liberal Arts.

#### Section III. - Why did these students decline to enroll?

The Subsequent Enrollment of Accepted Students Survey was distributed to the 7,728 students who were admitted to William Paterson, but declined to enroll. These students received an initial survey invitation via email followed by two reminders asking them to participate in the web survey. One hundred fifty-four respondents (two percent) completed this brief 7-question survey.

**Future Academic Plans:** Respondents were asked what their future academic plans were. The majority (66 percent) of respondents stated that they would be enrolling at another institution and 16 percent planned to delay enrollment, but were still considering William Paterson University.

**Reasons for Leaving:** To better understand why these accepted students did not enroll at William Paterson, the survey asked whether their reasons for not attending were personal, institutional, or both. The majority of students (48 percent) cited both personal and institutional reasons for not enrolling at William Paterson University.

What would have persuaded you to enroll: The survey asked, "What, if anything, would have persuaded them to enroll at William Paterson University?" The responses to this question are separated to show the responses of those who are not currently attending another institution (Table 13) and those who decided to enroll elsewhere (Table 14).

For those who did not attend another institution, 30 percent who responded to the question "What would have persuaded you to enroll at William Paterson University?" mentioned affordability or aid, and 20 percent cited program options.

For those who decided to attend another institution, 18 percent who responded to the question "What would have persuaded you to enroll at William Paterson University?" stated scholarships would have persuaded them, 16 percent said receiving financial aid, and 14 percent mentioned they simply decided on another institution.
