Course Overview:

This course will provide an introduction to the various areas of study associated with the field of developmental psychology. The major theorists, their theories and their influence on the field will all be covered. Findings of relevant classic and contemporary developmental empirical studies will be presented, with emphasis on the universal aspects of the human condition. By the end of the semester, you will have an increased understanding of the field of developmental psychology.

Course Objectives

Students will be able to display an increased ability to understand and express psychological ideas within the field of lifespan development. Students will discuss the integral theories via participation in online class discussions. Students will identify and define the key theoretical terms and facts in their online examinations.

What to expect/Learning objectives

This is an intensive 6-week summer class designed to provide a rich and thorough study of the field of lifespan development. To complete this class in the time-frame allowed the speed and workload expectations will be challenging. Your knowledge of the materials will be expressed on discussion boards, essays, assignments, and online quizzes. Please plan to give yourself enough time to complete these assignments, on average about 8-12 hours per week. In addition, expect that you need regular access to a functioning wifi connection and your computer.

1. Learn and understand the processes of development from conception through the end of the lifespan.
2. Learn and understand developmental theory from historical and contemporary perspectives.
3. Learn and understand the methods, research, and evidence that shaped this field
4. Learn and understand the biological, behavioral, and sociocultural perspectives underlying the various processes of human development.

Prerequisites and Background: Students attempting this course should have successfully completed PSY 1100 (General Psychology) or the equivalent. In addition, students are strongly recommended to be familiar with the Blackboard (BB) support documentation: <http://bit.ly/wpu-bb-stu>; and the BB help for students: <https://help.blackboard.com/Learn/Student> to facilitate your use of the online learning management system, BB.

To successfully complete this course you will need regular access to BB (<https://bb.wpunj.edu/>) and to the Launchpad/Learning Curve online component associated with the required textbook. All of the chapter quizzes and assignments listed in the course calendar are on Launchpad, and can only be completed online. It is your responsibility to gain access to BB and Launchpad and to become proficient in using them. I am your instructor and want to support your success in the course, but I am not your 24-hour technical support representative. Grading

For each chapter in the book, graded quizzes and activities will be assigned via the Launchpad component of the textbook, which must be completed through the Launchpad site. Successful and timely completion of these quizzes and activities will count towards **60%** of your grade.

For each chapter in the book, **1 discussion question** will be posted on Blackboard, which must be responded to through the Blackboard site. Successful and timely completion of these discussion questions will count towards **15%** of your grade.

A total of **3 essays** must be submitted through the Turnitin.com component of the Blackboard site for this class. The minimum length requirement for each essay is 1000 words. The end of chapter questions provided by the textbook are good suggestions for essay questions/topics, but students may write an essay on any topic they choose, as long as it is relevant to the topic of lifespan development. Essays are graded on a 10-point scale. Successful and timely completion of these essays will count towards **25%** of your grade.

Discussions

Your discussion posts for each chapter are due on BB the day after the respective chapter assignments and quizzes are due on Launchpad, (see the schedule attached to this syllabus). The discussions are intended to be interactive and conversational, hence you will earn more points for posting on multiple days and staying engaged in a discussion. Posting only on the final day (especially just before the deadline) limits the interaction you have with others and thus tends to earn fewer points. For **responses** to other people's comments you may contribute in any manner you wish, but responses should contribute meaningfully to the discussion (i.e., be more meaningful than a simple "I agree/disagree" statements, or "I also found that interesting"). Adding opinions, clarifications, additional questions, and outside materials are all acceptable forms of responses that will earn points. You can expect that I will also be participating in these discussions as I am looking forward to interacting with you!

There are two rules about these discussions: (1) Quality is more important than quantity in terms of grading; (2) Be respectful to others. If your comments are hurtful or disrespectful you may be censured or prohibited from the discussion (forfeiting that portion of your grade).

Helpful hints for earning all points on the discussion boards and essay assignments!

- Show off understanding of the text: do this by using your own words, anecdotes, and applications that clarify what things mean or how they work. Use your comments and responses to **demonstrate an understanding of more than one major topic** in the chapter.
 - o **Avoid using word-for-word quotes** from the text or other discussions on the internet, journals, etc. If you are not demonstrating what YOU have learned (and only show off that you can cut and paste text) that will not get the points you want. **Please, please, please DO NOT QUOTE things out of your text** – summarize in your own words and explain them
- Go above and beyond: Most people like earning points beyond simply passing (70%), but to get those points you need to **do more than the minimum requirement**. So post for depth by bringing in outside sources to complement what you learned in the textbook, or bringing in personal stories and ideas to enrich your posts. Depth is more important in essays than terse and shallow definitions – even if you answer multiple questions

- Avoid quick and simple responses. Use your discussion posts to TEACH other people in the class. The better you can do this, the more points you will earn. You're in this thing together!
- Ask the tough questions: adding questions that make you and your classmates think is the key to creating a good discussion. You can ask me things, as well, and I will happily chime in with what I can from the learning/cognitive literature.
 - Avoid posting all of your responses and comments in one day, or just one afternoon. Discussions should be, well, discussions. So check in regularly with discussion boards to stay interactive and be a frequent contributor to the discussion.
- Build off each other: I will often post a response or two, and others in the class may post before you do. While you are welcome to address the same issue, you are responsible for *understanding and moving the discussion forward*. Use what you learned in the discussion board and importantly, go beyond what has already been stated.
 - Avoid being highly repetitive with other posts on a chapter, or making errors that have been corrected in a chapter. Summarizing what others have already stated, or repeating mistakes already made and corrected on the discussion board should be avoided.
- Respect your peers. Everyone makes mistakes: whether factual, grammatical, or impulsive. You SHOULD help people understand if a correction is needed, but do so kindly and patiently.
 - Avoid off-hand, mean, or potentially hurtful comments. If you violate this and are consistently disrespectful you will lose access to the discussion board and forfeit that portion of your grade.

Essays

A total of **three essays** will be due on Turnitin.com during the term. Information for using Turnitin.com is provided below. Grading for essays will reflect whether you fulfilled the requirement or went above and beyond; whether you demonstrated clear and accurate understanding of the textbook; and/or whether you added original and innovative contributions to the discussion. You will earn fewer points if you post only the minimum required or less, restate ideas from the text without more fully clarifying them, post ideas that are inaccurate, and/or post unoriginal and redundant essays. The end of chapter questions provided by the textbook are good suggestions for essay questions/topics, but you may write essays on topics of your own choice, as long as they are relevant to the topic of lifespan development. I will also provide written feedback/grades for each essay to each student individually via email through the BB site. Attached to this syllabus is a copy of the essay feedback/grade sheet that I will be using.

Turnitin Use Policy: Plagiarism is using somebody else's ideas and/or statements in your writing without correctly identifying and citing those sources. As one resource for helping you avoid plagiarism, your written work in this class may be submitted to Turnitin.com, or a similar detection method, for an evaluation of the originality of your ideas and proper use and attribution of sources. By taking this course, you agree that all assignments may be subject to some form of originality review, including Turnitin antiplagiarism testing

Changes in Course Requirements: Since all classes do not progress at the same rate, the instructor may wish to modify the requirements or their timing as circumstances dictate. However, the students must be given adequate notification. Moreover there may be non-typical classes for which these requirements are not strictly applicable in each instance and may need modification. If such



modification is needed, it must conform to the spirit of this policy statement. All changes will be documented on the course website, and students are required to adhere to changes as they are presented online.

Late policy, missed tests, etc : Assignments and quizzes are to be completed on or before the due date. Discussion board postings can not be completed late for any reason. These assignments are interactive discussions to be completed with the entire class and this is not possible after the deadline. In necessary circumstances and only with a valid, documented excuse presented within one week of the original due date to the instructor, then a late assignment essay may be accepted to replace a discussion board posting for that chapter. No assignments nor make-ups can be accepted after the final due date of the course.

Appropriate Classroom Behavior: While this class is to be conducted online, if the situation arises, here is the university policy on classroom behavior.
