Course Structure: This course will include:

- 1. <u>TITLE OF COURSE AND COURSE NUMBER</u>: Senior Seminar, PSY 480-81, Credits: 3.
- 2. <u>DESCRIPTION OF COURSE</u>: This course serves as a vehicle for integrating current and previous learning about psychology into a coherent form. It is an opportunity for you to discuss important issues of psychological relevance and to express yourself in writing and on the Discussion Board. Issues relating to career development will be covered in a writing assignment and in the Discussion Forum. Your participation in the Discussion is an **ESSENTIAL** part of this course as is communicating with your fellow students.
- 3. <u>COURSE PREREQUISITES</u>: All core requirements of the major. This should be the last psychology course taken by seniors about to graduate.
- 4. <u>COURSE OBJECTIVES</u>: There are four objectives in the senior seminar. The first objective is to expose you to the diversity of thought and methods used within psychology. The second objective is to further your development of writing and communications skills -- in keeping with the achievement level implied by a degree in higher education. A third objective is to continue to develop an appreciation for the content of psychology, a sensitivity to the ethical issues that are integral to the field of psychology and to society, in general. The fourth objective is preparation for the next "chapter" of your life.
- 5. <u>STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES</u>: The student learning outcomes that correspond to these objectives are differentially emphasized by various faculty, but all of them fulfill the spirit of a senior seminar.

You should:

a) be engaged in the process of transitioning to the next phase of your life.....career, strategies, goals.

b) be knowledgeable and be able to communicate some of the most well-known empirical readings and issues in psychology and evaluate their impact on society.

c) be knowledgeable of and be able to discuss ethical issues in psychology.

Written and communication skills are similarly reinforced by some combination of the following:

e) be able to review a study, topic, or theoretical or applied issue in one or more brief papers;

f) be able to discuss your own perspective on issues and topics.

g) be able to discuss career-related issues and challenges.

6. <u>TOPICAL OUTLINE OF COURSE</u>:

This course will consist of discussion, critical thinking, concise writing and hands-on careerrelated information & discussion:

You will produce two papers in this course: A CV that you can use for career-related and graduate education-related needs AND a paper based on content area of interest selected from a list of topics (See Focused Topics below)(Maximum: two-pages each, APA format)
